



What Are the Carry-On Baggage Rules for Hawaiian Airlines?

Introduction

Knowing the carry-on rules before arriving at the airport can make the check-in and boarding process easier. Hawaiian Airlines currently allows passengers to bring **one carry-on bag plus one smaller personal item**. The carry-on bag must fit within the airline's published size limit, while the personal item should fit under the seat in front of you.

Understanding the **hawaiian airlines rules baggage** requirements is especially important when traveling with electronics, liquids, medicines, or other restricted articles. Passengers should also remember that airport security requirements, including TSA rules for U.S. departures, apply separately from the airline's baggage policy.

How Many Carry-On Bags Are Allowed?

Under the current Hawaiian Airlines baggage information, passengers are allowed:

1 carry-on bag

1

1 smaller personal item

2

The personal item can include items such as a purse, briefcase, or laptop bag and should be placed under the seat in front of the passenger. The airline's travel guidance states that anything additional or larger than the permitted carry-on must be checked.

This means passengers should avoid bringing multiple large cabin bags because additional pieces may need to be checked at the airport.

Hawaiian Airlines Carry-On Size Limit

The current published carry-on size limit is:

22 x 14 x 9 inches

This measurement includes the bag's wheels and handles. Hawaiian Airlines' current travel guidance, which is presented through its Alaska Airlines integration, specifies this maximum size for carry-on luggage.

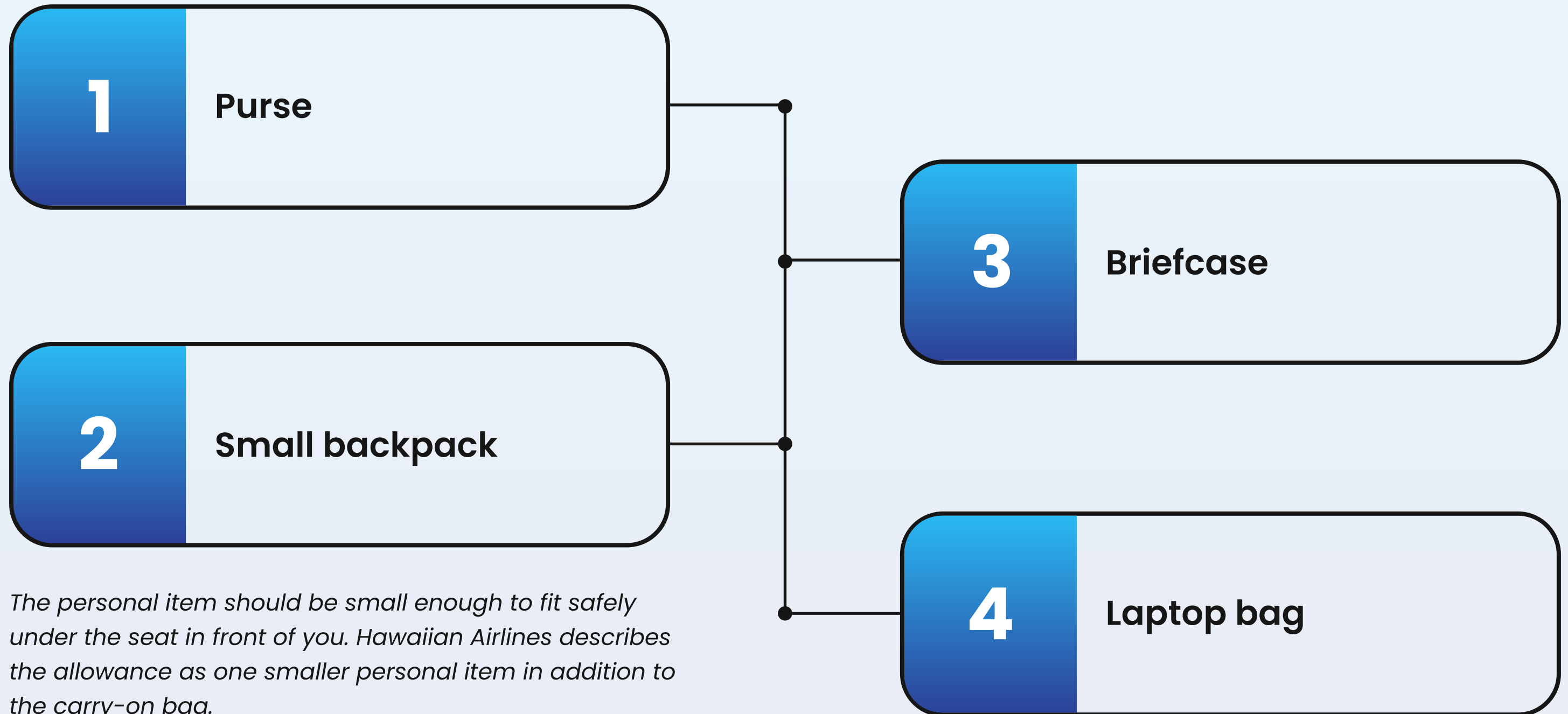
When measuring your suitcase, include every part of the bag that contributes to its overall dimensions. Expandable sections should also be considered when the bag is packed.

Key point:

A suitcase that appears to be standard carry-on size may still exceed the limit if its wheels, handles, or expanded pockets add extra inches.

Personal Item Requirements

A personal item is separate from the main carry-on bag. Common examples include a:



The personal item should be small enough to fit safely under the seat in front of you. Hawaiian Airlines describes the allowance as one smaller personal item in addition to the carry-on bag.

Passengers should avoid treating the personal-item allowance as permission to bring another full-size suitcase. The purpose of the second item is to provide convenient access to smaller essentials during the flight.

Is There a Separate Carry-On Weight Limit?

The current Hawaiian/Alaska travel guidance prominently specifies the 22 x 14 x 9-inch size requirement and the one-bag-plus-one-personal-item allowance. The published guidance cited here does not state a general universal carry-on weight number alongside those dimensions.

Because baggage conditions can depend on itinerary, aircraft, or special circumstances, passengers should check their individual reservation and the latest airline baggage instructions when a specific weight restriction is a concern.

A practical approach is to keep your carry-on reasonably light enough to lift and place safely in the overhead compartment.



Overhead Bin Space and Boarding

Even when a passenger has an eligible carry-on bag, overhead storage is not guaranteed to remain available until boarding.

For Saver fares, the airline states that carry-on allowance is the same as Main fares, but Saver passengers board last. Hawaiian/Alaska notes that overhead bin space is limited and available on a **first-come, first-served basis**.

Therefore, arriving at the gate prepared to follow crew instructions is important. If overhead space is unavailable, the airline may require a bag to be checked.



What Can Go Inside Your Carry-On?

Passengers commonly use their carry-on for clothing, electronics, travel documents, medication, chargers, and other personal essentials.

However, not every item is permitted. Hawaiian Airlines advises passengers to review its prohibited and restricted items information, with particular attention to lithium-ion batteries and devices that use them, including smart bags and self-propelled luggage.

Travelers should confirm the applicable requirements before packing batteries, electronic equipment, or unusual items.

Liquids and the TSA 3-1-1 Rule

Airline baggage rules are only one part of the process. Passengers departing from U.S. airports must also follow TSA screening requirements.

For carry-on liquids, gels, and aerosols, TSA's 3-1-1 rule generally allows:



Containers of **3.4 ounces (100 mL) or less**



Liquids packed in **one quart-size clear bag**



One liquids bag per passenger

TSA recommends keeping the liquids bag easy to access during screening.

Examples can include shampoo, toothpaste, lotion, liquid makeup, and similar products.

Military Travel on Official Orders

Electronics are commonly packed in carry-on luggage because travelers may need them during the journey. Hawaiian Airlines advises passengers to pay attention to restrictions involving lithium-ion batteries and electronic devices. At TSA security checkpoints, larger personal electronic devices may need to be removed from the carry-on for screening, depending on the checkpoint and available screening technology. Hawaiian's travel guidance recommends being prepared to remove qualifying electronics and place them separately for inspection.
