

When a car key snaps, a fob stops responding, or the ignition refuses to turn, the problem usually feels bigger than the inconvenience itself. The work behind a car lockout

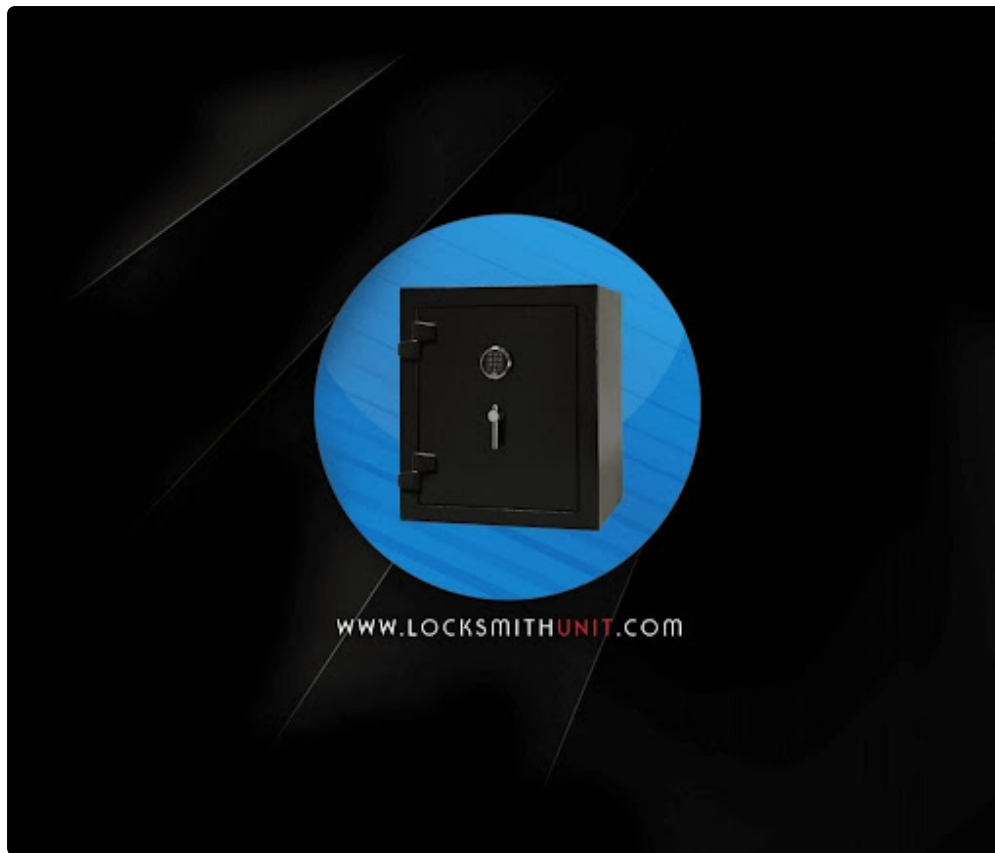
