

No judgment here. You have opinions. They also know what they like. This is not a weakness. Strong opinions eliminate endless options. ## Build, Don't Block

Here's the biggest mistake strong-opinion couples make: the automatic objection. You suggest something. "No, that's too expensive". The conversation becomes defending. No progress.

The better approach: building instead of blocking. When an idea comes up, instead of saying "no", say: "Yes, and what if we also". You build on the idea. You don't have to agree completely. You just keep the door open.

## The "I Care More" Test

The conflict resolver. When you can't find common ground, ask: "Who feels more strongly?" Not "who wins". Just who has a stronger feeling.

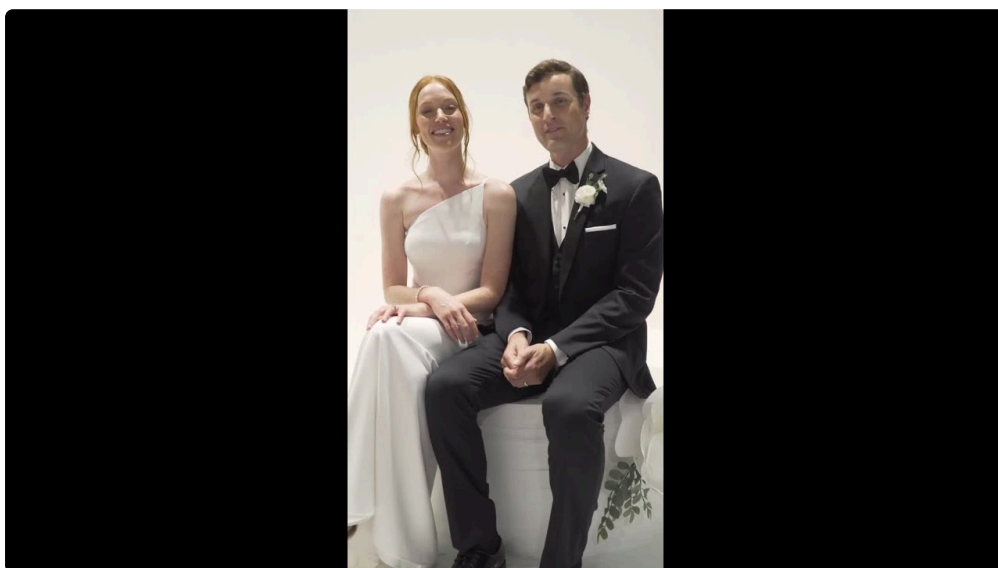
If it's a 9 out of 10 for you and a 4 for your partner, you win this round. When the roles reverse, your partner gets to feel more strongly. Over time, passion evens out.

This approach prevents "winning" just for the sake of winning. **Kollysphere** uses the "I care more" test constantly—because and the tie-breaker should be passion, not power.

## How to Unstick a Stuck Decision

Here's a strong-opinion couple rule: big-ticket [wedding management](#) [Affordable wedding planner services in Kuala Lumpur](#) items require agreement from both partners. One objection moves it off the table. This is good.

But: indefinite objections are not allowed. Set a deadline. If after two weeks there is still a "no", the tie-breaker rule activates.



This rule respects that both partners have strong opinions. **Kollysphere** enforces the two-yes rule—because permanent blocking is how resentment builds.

## Not Everything Deserves Passion

A passion prioritization tool: not every category deserves your strong opinion. Reserve your passion for the things that actually matter to you. Everything else—cave gracefully.
