Surface Preparation

You need a clean, flat, and structurally sound substrate before any tile goes down. Remove old [flooring](#), adhesives, and loose debris; use a grinder or scraper for stubborn material. Check for level and deflection: floors should typically be within 1/8" over 10 feet and meet manufacturer limits for deflection. Repair or replace any damaged subflooring and reinforce joists if needed.

Address moisture and vapor issues next. Test concrete with a moisture meter or calcium chloride test and install a vapor barrier or waterproof membrane when levels exceed tile manufacturer limits.

Apply a cement backer board or a bonded self-leveling compound on uneven surfaces. Fasten backer board with recommended screws and thin-set; stagger joints and tape seams with alkali-resistant mesh.

Tile Selection and Design

Start by matching tile type to room use and traffic. Choose porcelain for wet, high-traffic areas and ceramic or natural stone where appropriate. Check PEI ratings and slip-resistance (R or COF values) for safety in kitchens and bathrooms.

Select tile size with layout in mind: large-format tiles reduce grout lines but demand flatter substrates and more precise leveling. For small rooms, smaller tiles or mosaics allow easier transitions over uneven areas.

Decide grout color, joint width, and edge treatments early. Narrow joints (1/16"–1/8") suit rectified porcelain; wider joints (1/8"–3/8") accommodate natural stone movement. Choose epoxy grout for stain resistance in kitchens or commercial spaces and cement grout for typical

use.

Plan transitions to other floor types and location of focal patterns. Create a mock layout or dry-run cuts to minimize awkward edge pieces at walls.

Professional installers begin with a layout grid and reference lines to ensure balanced cuts and consistent grout joints. They snap chalk lines from the room center or a primary sightline, then dry-lay tiles to verify the pattern.

Use a quality thin-set mortar suitable for tile type and substrate; follow manufacturer mixing ratios and pot life. Apply mortar with a notched trowel sized to tile dimensions (e.g., 1/2" x 1/2" square-notched for 12"x24" porcelain).

Employ tile leveling systems on large-format tiles to prevent lippage. Use spacers to maintain consistent joints and remove excess mortar before it skins over. Cut tiles with a wet saw for straight edges and a grinder or nipper for curves and notches.

Allow proper cure times: typically 24–72 hours for thin-set before grouting, then 24–48 hours before light foot traffic. Seal natural stone and cement-based grout per product instructions to protect against stains and moisture.
