Their primary role is to manage life-threatening medical emergencies.



For dental pain or trauma, they can often provide temporary pain relief through medication and possibly antibiotics for an infection, but they cannot perform an extraction, a root canal, or re-implant a knocked-out tooth. This means you'll likely leave with a bill for the ER visit and still need to see a dentist for the definitive - and separately billed - fix.

What the ER can and can't do for dental trauma or infection

I've seen patients come from the ER with a prescription for antibiotics and strong painkillers after a severe abscess. The ER staff did their job: they stabilized a potential infection that could spread. What they couldn't do was address the source of that infection, which was a decayed tooth needing either a root canal or extraction. The patient then had to schedule a dental appointment, often still in pain, and pay for two separate visits.

For physical trauma, like a broken jaw, the ER is absolutely the right place. For a broken tooth, they might be able to smooth a sharp edge to prevent soft-tissue cuts, but they cannot place a filling or a crown. Their workflow is not designed for restorative dentistry. You're paying emergency room prices for a stopgap measure, not a solution.

When is the ER the safest option?

There are specific, serious scenarios where the ER is the correct and safest first stop. If a dental issue is accompanied by signs of a systemic, spreading infection - such as a fever, significant facial swelling that impacts your vision or ability to breathe or swallow, or nausea and dizziness - you need immediate medical attention. Uncontrolled bleeding from the mouth that doesn't stop with direct pressure is another ER situation.

Similarly, if a dental injury is part of a larger trauma, like a car accident or a fall that caused loss of consciousness, head to the ER first to rule out more critical injuries. The rule of thumb is: if the problem seems confined to your mouth and you are otherwise medically stable, a dental clinic is almost always the more efficient and cost-effective path to a cure.

- **Go to the ER first if you have:** trouble breathing or swallowing
- **Go to the ER first if you have:** facial swelling with fever or dizziness
- **Go to the ER first if you have:** heavy bleeding that won't stop with pressure
- **Go to the ER first if you have:** a facial injury tied to a car crash, fall, or head trauma

How to avoid duplicate costs from "double visits"

If you do end up at the ER first, you can take steps to minimize duplicate costs and streamline your subsequent dental care. Time is tissue. Follow this protocol exactly: First, handle the tooth by the crown (the chewing surface), not the root. If it's dirty, rinse it gently with water for no more than 10 seconds. Do not scrub it or use soap. The critical step is to try to reposition it back into the socket immediately, if possible. Gently push it in, holding it in place with light finger pressure or by biting down softly on a clean cloth.

If you cannot reposition it, you must keep it moist. The best options are to place it in a container of milk or to keep it in your mouth, between your cheek and gums. Do not let it dry out. The goal is to preserve the delicate cells on the root surface. Getting to a dentist with the tooth properly preserved within an hour gives you the highest chance of saving it, which can save you thousands in future replacement costs.

Sedation and pain control options for emergency visits
