Of course, small environments are not automatically calm. An over-stimulating tv, a loud roommate, or a consistent stream of visitors can still overwhelm. The human side of everyday care

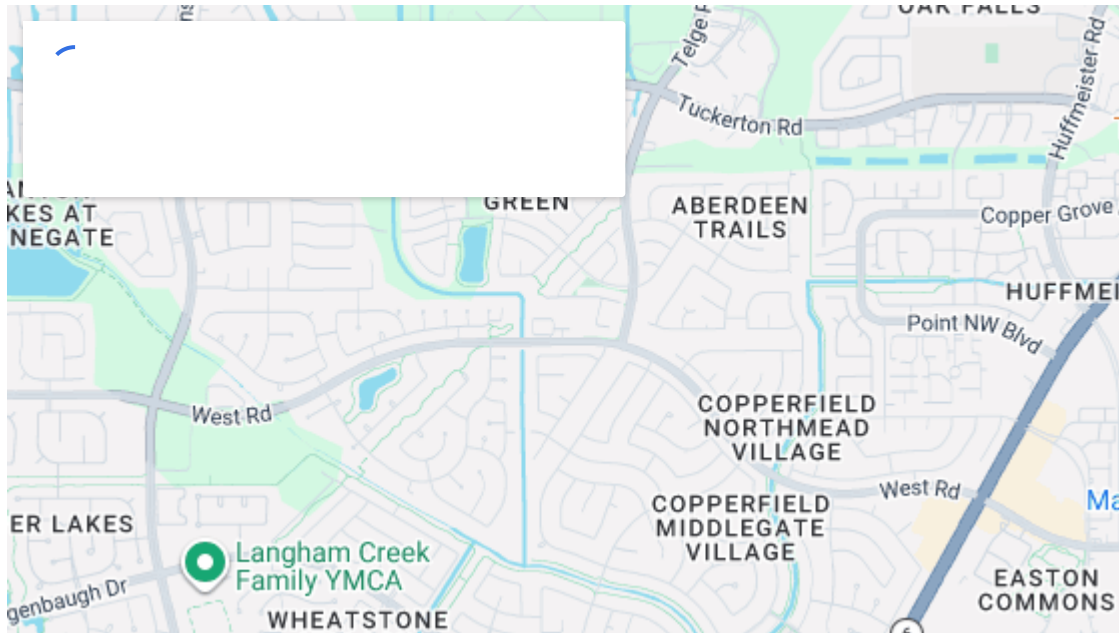

from her childhood. Showers ended up being uneventful. The task was the same. The difference was the relationship and the ability to personalize.

Daily care in a small home also tends to blend more naturally with normal life.
